ETA Issues TEGL 9-21 - Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Adult, Dislocated Worker and Youth Activities Program Allotments for Program Year (PY) 2022; PY 2022 Allotments for the Wagner-Peyser Act Employment Service (ES) Program; and PY 2022 Allotments of Workforce Information Grants to States. The Employment and Training Administration (ETA) has published Training and Employment Guidance Letter (TEGL) 9-21. DOL Announces \$3.4m Funding Opportunity to Attract, Retain Women in Registered Apprenticeships, Nontraditional Occupations. The U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) announced a funding opportunity of \$3.4 million for up to nine grants to attract and keep women in <u>Registered Apprenticeship Programs</u> and industries where they are underrepresented such as manufacturing, infrastructure, cybersecurity and healthcare. Administered by the department's <u>Employment and Training Administration</u> and <u>Women's Bureau</u>, the Women in Apprenticeship and Nontraditional Occupations grant program supports community-based organizations in their efforts to recruit, train and retain more women in Registered Apprenticeships and nontraditional occupations. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) announced over \$1.4 million in housing assistance through the Foster Youth to Independence (FYI) initiative for youth transitioning out of foster care who are experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness. May marked National Foster Care Month, a time to renew the commitment to ensuring all young people who are or have been in foster care have the support and resources they need to thrive. HHS Invites Applications for its Refugee Career Pathways Program. The Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' (HHS) Administration for Children and Families (ACF) is accepting applications for its Refugee Career Pathways (RCP) program. Through the RCP program, ORR will provide funding to enable eligible Afghan entrants to obtain self-sufficiency by obtaining the means to secure professional or skilled employment drawing upon previously acquired knowledge, skills, and experience. Under the RCP program, the primary focus is to assist refugees and other eligible populations in learning about career pathways and developing individualized plans to gain employment and advance within their chosen career field. Allowable activities will include case management, training and technical assistance, specialized English language training, and mentoring. In addition, eligible participants may receive financial assistance for costs related to the establishment or reestablishment of credentials, such as obtaining educational credits or enrollment in required certification programs. 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HHS Announces \$2 Million Funding Opportunity to Establish National Center of Excellence on Social Media and Mental Wellness. Building on President Biden's Unity Agenda priority to tackle our nation's mental health crisis, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, is announcing \$2 million in funding to establish a national center of excellence (CoE) on social media and mental wellness. The purpose of the CoE will be to develop and disseminate information, guidance, and training on the impact—including benefits and risks—that social media use has on children and youth, especially the risks to their mental health. This CoE will also examine clinical and social interventions that can be used to mitigate the risks. Social media use can be associated with negative mental health outcomes, and children and youth are particularly vulnerable. 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California's Cradle-to-Career Data System Achieves Early Milestones, Announces Multi-Agency Data Sharing Agreement. The Office of Cradle-to-Career Data has signed landmark legal agreements with 15 education, social service, and workforce entities that allow for the creation of data sets on student progress from pre-K through college and employment, one of several important early milestones that were announced at the May 11 Governing Board meeting. These milestones make progress toward creating a transformative statewide data system that will link together existing data on education, workforce, financial aid, and social services to create tools for use by students, families, policy makers, researchers, and the public. Zach had just moved to Maine from Texas and was very unsure of his future. He joined the Youth Virtual Work Readiness Cohort in August to familiarize himself with the Maine job market and to refine his career readiness skills. Zach was enrolled in the COVID NDWG and Youth programs, which allowed for support with accessing state benefits and humanitarian services while unemployed. After completion of the Cohort and support from his Career Advisor, **Zach** began a welding training at Midcoast School of Technology and found a real passion for that field. Since he had signed up for benefits which helped him pay his bills while in training, he was able to dedicate time to getting acclimated with the state, focus on improving his mental health, and put full effort into his classes. In November, **Zach** obtained full employment in the service department of a car dealership, enabling more experience with welding. The job also offers free training if he decides he needs to further his technical skills and there are many areas within the company for growth. With a steady income and opportunities for growth, **Zach** is getting to a place financially where he will no longer need state assistance and will be able to be financially independent and stable.

The U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) announced the availability of \$8 million in funding over four years to manage the Leadership for the Employment and Economic Advancement of People with Disabilities Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Policy Development Center. Administered by the department's Office of Disability Employment Policy, the LEAD Center is currently operated by a third-party contractor and will soon be funded by the grant announced. Once awarded, the center will continue to ensure people with disabilities, including those from historically underserved communities, have equal access to publicly funded workforce programs and services. The LEAD Center focuses on advancing economic self-sufficiency for people with disabilities, creating career pathways to competitive integrated employment and increasing data reporting on disability through WIOA programs. The Administration for Children & Families within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is accepting applications for its Transitional Living Program. The program provides safe, stable, and appropriate shelter for runaway and homeless youth ages 16 to under 22 for up to 18 months and, under extenuating circumstances, can be extended to 21 months. SAMHSA Invites Applications for its Tribal Opioid Response Grants. The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services is accepting applications for its Tribal Opioid Response (TOR) Grants program. The TOR program designed is to assist in addressing the overdose crisis in Tribal communities by increasing access to FDA-approved medications for the treatment of opioid use disorder, and supporting the continuum of prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery support services for opioid use disorder and co-occurring substance use disorders. HHS Invites Applications for its Basic Center Program. The Administration for Children & Families within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is accepting applications for its Basic Center Program. The program provides temporary shelter and counseling services to youth who have left home without permission of their parents or guardians, have been forced to leave home, or other homeless youth who might otherwise end up in the law enforcement or in the child welfare, mental health, or juvenile justice systems. BCPs work to establish or strengthen community-based programs that meet the immediate needs of runaway and homeless youth and their families. The Office for Victims of Crime within the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) is accepting applications for its Enhancing Access to Victim Services program. The program is designed to remove barriers that may prevent individuals from reporting crimes and accessing supportive services when they are harmed by improving and expanding the availability of accessible victim-centered, trauma-informed services for crime victims who are disabled, Deaf, hard-of-hearing, limited English proficient (LEP), blind and/or visually impaired. Administered by the department's <u>Employment and Training Administration</u> and <u>Women's Bureau</u>, Fostering Access, Rights and Equity grants are designed to support non-profit organizations that connect women workers to additional services, benefits and legal assistance. Mental Health Care in the United States: The Case for Federal Action. This <u>report</u> released by the U.S. Senate Finance Committee was developed to support the current bipartisan initiative being undertaken by the Committee to improve behavioral health for Americans covered under federal health programs. The Committee takes a broad view of behavioral health to include both mental health conditions and substance use disorders (SUD), reflecting the reality that mental health and SUD are often, though not always, cooccurring.

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Connecting Youth During the COVID-19 Pandemic. This <u>infographic</u> released by the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services explores the impact the COVID-19 pandemic had on programs that support young people, ages 16-24, who experience disconnection from school and work, often referred to as "opportunity youth." It provides an overview of which education, job training, and supportive services, in addition to enrollment and implementation practices were added or ended during the first year (spring 2020-spring 2021) of the pandemic by programs that help youth reconnect to education, obtain employment, and advance in the labor market.

BLACK LGBTQ+ MENTAL HEALTH. This <u>infographic</u> released by the Institute's Center of Excellence on LGBTQ+ Behavioral Health Equity and the African American Behavioral Health Center of Excellence provides a visual description of how mental health impacts experiences of Black LGBTQ+ individuals. It also includes tips for how behavioral health providers can also provide support.

Implementing the New Digital Equity Act: What Workforce and Education Advocates Need to Know. This fact sheet released by the National Skills Coalition provides an overview of key information related to the legislation, which passed Congress last November as part of the broader Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. The fact sheet is designed for advocates on workforce boards and in American Job Centers, community colleges, nonprofit community-based organizations, labor-management partnerships, adult education providers, and immigrant-serving organizations who are curious about how this new funding can support workers.

Children's Mental Health Awareness/Pieces of Me: MOVE It Forward 2022 Toolkit. This <u>toolkit</u> released by Youth MOVE National focuses around intersectional perspectives related to personal identity and youth-serving systems using some of the platforms that the YMCI has created.

Behavioral Health Implementation Guide for the National Standards for Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services in Health and Health Care. This <u>guide</u> released by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Minority Health underscores the ways in which the National CLAS Standards can improve access to behavioral health care, promote quality behavioral health programs and practice, and ultimately reduce persistent disparities in mental health and substance use treatment for underserved minority communities.
